
Organizational Grants

- Grants of up to \$5,000 depending on budget size
- Budget < \$2m: general operating expenses
- \$490,000 in grants was awarded to 146 organizations in FY21



Opportunity Fund

- Grants of up to \$1,000 for individual artists and educators
- Professional development, community arts experiences, local arts events, school field trip, or matching MCC festival grant
- \$200,000 allocated in FY21



Artist Fellowship Award

- Five unrestricted grants of \$10,000 each
- Mid-career artists living in Boston
- Boston artists of all artistic disciplines eligible

Radical Imagination for Racial Justice

- Partnership with MassArt, funded by Surdna Foundation
- \$250,000 in grants awarded to first cohort of BIPOC artists/collectives
- Artists asked to reimagine a racially just Boston



- Staffed by Artist Resource Manager
- Response to artists' frustrations with navigating the channels of city government.
- Virtual office hours, over 1000 artists helped in FY20



Poet Laureate/Youth
Poet Laureate

- Established in 2008, four year terms
- Acts as an advocate for poetry, language, and the arts and creates a unique artistic legacy through public readings and civic events.
- Porsha Olayiwola appointed in 2019, Alondra Bobadilla appointed in 2020

- Promote and exhibit work of local artists








Cultural Equity





 - June 25, 14 attendees testified
 - June 30, 32 attendees testified
 - Nearly 300 attendees
 - Survey: 645 total respondents;
 377 respondents with Boston zip codes
 - Written Testimony: Over 160 letters with about 75% favoring removal

Cancellation of classes, residencies, gigs, performances, and events



Closure of spaces to create and present their work

- MA nonprofits and municipal cultural organizations reported \$588,334,079 in lost revenue since March 2020, and
- Individual artists, teaching artists, and scientists/humanists cited \$30,403,616 in lost personal income due to the pandemic.
