DEFINITIONS



RESILIENCE is the ability of a system to prepare for extreme events and ideally “bounce forward” after impacts to become greener, healthier, and more equitable.



NATURAL HAZARDS can include flooding, extreme wind events, winter weather, earthquakes, fires, extreme temperatures, drought, and more.



HAZARD MITIGATION is the effort to reduce impacts from natural hazards through planning, policy, education, infrastructure projects, and more.



A NATURAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN (NHMP) is a strategy to reduce risks and vulnerabilities associated with natural hazards, to protect homes, businesses, and the critical infrastructure that keeps our City running.
