

# Introduction

The Client Services Handbook provides an overview of the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program, a historical summary of Ryan White Part A funding in the Boston EMA, a brief description of the Planning council role in the service allocation process, and definitions of the Ryan White Part A services that are currently available in the Boston EMA. The handbook lists the Ryan White Part A service providers with funding for the current fiscal year (FY20), the amount of each award, and a summary of the Part A services that are offered by provider. This document is intended to serve as a resource to assist service providers with linking clients to services across the EMA. It is also a supporting document for the Ryan White Planning Council.

\*Please note that the funding amounts reflect the initial allocations and that allocations might shift slightly throughout the year based on changing agency and client needs.

# The Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Extension Act Part A Background

The original Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency (CARE) Act of 1990 was amended in 1996 and 2000, replaced by the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act of 2006, and most recently reauthorized in 2009 as the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Extension Act. While the 2009 extension expired on September 30, 2013, the legislation did not include any sunset provision, and the legislation, therefore, continues to be in effect. Funding continues to be dependent upon the Federal appropriations process.


The Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program (RWHAP) is composed of five parts (A, B, C, D, and F). Funds from Part A provide direct financial assistance to Eligible Metropolitan Areas (EMA) and Transitional Grant Areas (TGA) most severely affected by the HIV epidemic and are intended to develop or enhance access to a comprehensive continuum of high quality, community-based care for low-income individuals with HIV/AIDS and their families. A comprehensive continuum of care should include primary medical care, including HIV specific care and supportive services, which aim to improve access to care, promote health, and enhance the quality of life.

The Health Resources and Services Administration's HIV/AIDS Bureau (HRSA/HAB) administers the Ryan White Program. Part A formula and supplemental components of the grant as well as Minority AIDS Initiative (MAI) funds, which address racial inequities by supporting services prioritizing populations that identify as a racial or ethnic minority. The formula component is based on reported living HIV/AIDS cases in the EMA or TGA as of December 31 in the most recent calendar year for which data are available. Supplemental grants are awarded competitively based on demonstrated need and other selective criteria. MAI funding is allocated by formula according to the distribution of living HIV/AIDS cases among racial and ethnic minorities.

Grants are awarded to each EMA's Chief Elected Official (CEO). The CEO (Mayor, City of Boston) then appoints an HIV/AIDS Services Planning Council and designates a Grantee (Boston Public Health Commission [BPHC]). The Planning Council establishes priorities and develops a plan for meeting those priorities. BPHC must distribute grant funds according to the priorities established by the Planning Council.

# Part A Boston Eligible Metropolitan Area

The Boston Eligible Metropolitan Area (EMA) service region includes seven counties in Massachusetts – Bristol, Essex, Middlesex, Norfolk, Plymouth, Suffolk, and Worcester – and three counties in New Hampshire – Hillsborough, Rockingham, and Strafford. All organizations in the EMA that provide or propose to offer HIV-related services to people living in the EMA are eligible to apply for Part A funding.



# Ryan White Part A Overview

For FY 2020, HRSA awarded a Part A grant to the CEO of the Boston EMA (Mayor) on January 16, 2020, for \$14,894,764. The Boston EMA HIV/AIDS Services Planning Council established the ranking of priority services and service category allocations (see table below). Through a combination of contract renewal and competitive bidding process, the Boston Public Health Commission funded 91 programs within 33 direct service agencies following the Planning Council's priorities.



# Ryan White Part A Minority AIDS Initiative Overview

Minority AIDS Initiative (MAI) funds, designed to provide core medical and related support services to improve access and reduce racial disparities in health outcomes in metropolitan areas hardest hit HIV/AIDS. MAI funds under Parts A and B are distributed according to a formula (based on the distribution of populations disproportionately impacted by HIV/AIDS) and coincide with grant cycles under each Part. Minority AIDS Initiative (MAI) additionally falls under Part F, which are earmarked to support capacitybuilding activities in minority and minority-serving community-based organizations delivering HIV/AIDS services in communities of color.

After the original FY 1999 MAI award, the Planning Council reviewed MAI guidelines and recommended the Boston EMA utilize MAI funds to provide additional Medical Case Management and Psychosocial Support services. Each year the Planning Council considers this decision and discusses whether other services categories should be funded with the MAI grant. Their decision is based on many data points, including the current epidemiological profile of people living with HIV in the EMA, outcomes data for minority populations, and results of needs assessments and consumer focus groups.

The graph and chart below illustrate the history of Part A Boston EMA award allocations, including MAI funding. For FY 2020, the Boston EMA has been funded to provide Emergency Financial Assistance, Linguistic Services, Medical Case Management, Non-Medical Case Management, Psychosocial Support, and Other Professional Services (Legal) under MAI.

### Service Definitions

### AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP/HDAP) (Drug Reimbursement)

The service funded under this category is the provision of medically prescribed pharmaceuticals used in the prevention, management, and treatment of HIV disease. Services funded under this category are only available for HIV+ individuals who have met the eligibility requirements for participation in the plan and have been enrolled according to standard Plan procedure.

### **Emergency Financial Assistance**

Provides limited one-time or short-term payments to assist the RWHAP client with an emergent need. Emergency financial assistance can occur as a direct payment to an agency or through a voucher program. *Direct cash payments to clients are not permitted.* Services include essential utilities, housing, food (including groceries and food vouchers), transportation, and medication.

### Food Bank/Home-Delivered Meals

This category includes the provision of actual food or meals. It also includes the provision of personal hygiene products and cleaning supplies. Examples include but are not limited to hot meals, home-delivered food; food banks; nutritional supplements; and the provision of nutrition counseling under the supervision of a registered dietician.

#### Health Education and Risk Reduction

Health Education/Risk Reduction is the provision of education to clients living with HIV about HIV transmission and how to reduce the risk of HIV transmission. It includes sharing information about medical and psychosocial support services and counseling with clients to improve their health status.

### Housing

Services funded under this category include the provision of short-term, emergency or transitional rental assistance, and the provision of housing search support. These services also include assessment, search, placement, and advocacy services provided by those who possess extensive knowledge of local, State, and Federal housing programs and how they can be accessed. The goal of this category is to improve a person's access and adherence to medical care and treatment by addressing the barrier of housing instability.

## Linguistic Services - MAI

The purpose of MAI Linguistic Services is to provide services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate to minority groups who are impacted by HIV. Services in this category are delivered by providers with diverse language and cultural capacity. Key activities address language as a critical barrier to access to core medical and support services and supporting the provision of culturally competent, high-quality care to Ryan White Part A clients. MAI Linguistic Services aim to provide both oral and written interpretation and translation services to Ryan White Part A clients, to enable clear communication between provider and client for HIV care and services.

### Medical Case Management

This service focuses on improving health outcomes for clients, including viral suppression rates. Activities funded under this category include linkage to and engagement in primary medical care and health-related support services in a manner that ensures timely, coordinated access to appropriate levels of care. Clientcentered services support a client's ability to maximize his/her self-sufficiency and independence. Key activities include information and referral; assessment of the client's needs and personal support systems; development of a comprehensive individualized service care plan; coordination of the services required to implement the plan; client monitoring to assess the efficacy of the plan; periodic reassessment; and adoption of the plan. It is expected that medical case management programs will establish and maintain effective linkages with primary care and other service providers and ensure that medical case management services are not being duplicated across providers. Services will also be provided within a harm reduction framework and will include basic risk assessment and risk reduction planning.

### Medical Case Management - MAI

The purpose of MAI Medical Case Management is to provide services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate to minority groups who are impacted by HIV. Services in this category are delivered by providers with diverse language and cultural capacity. Key activities include information and referral; assessment of the client's needs and personal support systems; development of a comprehensive individualized service care plan; coordination of the services required to implement the plan; client monitoring to assess the efficacy of the plan; periodic reassessment; and adoption of the plan. Providers funded for this service will also establish a link with a medical provider to facilitate client referrals. Services will also be provided within a harm reduction framework and will include basic risk assessment and risk reduction planning.

### Medical Case Management Training & Capacity Building Services

HIV Medical Case Management Training & Capacity Building (MCM TCB) services are to provide a range of training and capacity building services to HIV MCM programs and staff. The goal is to ensure that programs and their staff have knowledge, skills, and ability to provide the range of MCM services expected to be delivered to PLWH. These services can be provided in a variety of modalities, including but not limited to, classroom training, webinars, individualized agency technical assistance, the development and dissemination of resource materials, and through smaller regional provider meetings.

### **Medical Nutrition Therapy**

This category includes the provision of actual food or meals. Eligibility for this service requires certification by a physician and reassessment by a registered dietitian. Services funded under this category are the provision of calorically and nutritionally appropriate prepared food, which may include, but are not limited to: prepared meals; congregate meals; home-delivered food; food banks; nutritional supplements; and the provision of nutrition counseling under the supervision of a registered dietician.

### **Medical Transportation**

Services funded under this category include, but are not limited to, taxi vouchers and public and private transport services that enable clients to access HIV primary medical care and health-related support services.

### Non-Medical Case Management

Non-Medical Case Management services focus on improving access to both core medical and support services. Activities in this service category typically occur in community-based facilities that are not connected to medical facilities. Client-centered services support a client's ability to maximize his/her self-sufficiency and independence. Key activities include information and referral; assessment of the client's needs and personal support systems; development of a comprehensive individualized service care plan; coordination of the services required to implement the plan; client monitoring to assess the efficacy of the plan; periodic reassessment; and adoption of the plan. Services will also be provided within a harm reduction framework and will include basic risk assessment and risk reduction planning.

### Non-Medical Case Management - MAI

The purpose of MAI Medical Case Management is to provide services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate to minority groups who are impacted by HIV. Services in this category are delivered by providers with diverse language and cultural capacity. Key activities focus on creating access to social supports for eligible PLWH. This includes information and referral, assessment of the client's needs and personal support systems; development of a comprehensive individualized service care plan; coordination of the services required to implement the plan; client monitoring to assess the efficacy of the plan; periodic reassessment; and adoption of the plan. Services will also be provided within a harm reduction framework and will include basic risk assessment and risk reduction planning.

### Oral Health Care

Services funded under this category are the recruitment of dentists and preventive diagnostic and therapeutic services rendered by dentists, dental hygienists, and other dental practitioners licensed to provide health care in the State or jurisdiction.

### Other Professional Services—Legal

The goal of Other Professional Services—Legal is to provide clients with access to legal services necessary to improve client health outcomes. It aims to reduce the effects of HIV discrimination; assist with access to and maintenance of medical care; remove barriers to accessing care, treatment, and services. This service allows for the provision of professional and consultant services rendered by members of professions licensed and qualified to offer such services by local governing authorities.

### Other Professional Services—Legal - MAI

The purpose of MAI Other Professional Services is to provide services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate to minority groups who are impacted by HIV. Services in this category are delivered by providers with diverse language and cultural capacity. Key activities provide clients with access to legal services necessary to improve client health outcomes. It aims to reduce the effects of HIV discrimination; assist with access to and maintenance of medical care; remove barriers to accessing care, treatment, and services. This service allows for the provision of professional and consultant services rendered by members of professions licensed and qualified to offer such services by local governing authorities.

### **Psychosocial Support**

Services funded under this category provide counseling and emotional support to PLWH. In some instances, the person(s) providing the service might be a person infected with HIV and of the client's self-identified community. Such services include group and individual counseling sessions to address topics of stigma, isolation, behavioral health, and coping with an HIV diagnosis. Providers in this category may also work alongside Medical and Non-Medical Case Manager to assist in obtaining a range of services and entitlement that will meet the needs of the client and are provided by licensed or non-licensed, paraprofessional individuals.

### Psychosocial Support - MAI

The purpose of MAI Psychosocial Support is to provide services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate to minorities who are living with HIV/AIDS. Services funded under this category provide counseling and emotional support to PLWH. Providers are skilled in delivering services in a culturally competent manner to key minorities who are disproportionally affected by HIV. In some instances, the person(s) providing the service might be a person infected with HIV and of the client's self-identified community. Such services include group and individual counseling sessions to address topics of stigma, isolation, behavioral health, and coping with an HIV diagnosis. Providers in this category may also work alongside Medical and Non-Medical Case Manager to assist in obtaining a range of services and entitlement that will meet the needs of the client and are provided by licensed or non-licensed, paraprofessional individuals.

### Substance Abuse, Residential

Services funded under this category may include: Treatment to address substance abuse problems (including alcohol and legal and illegal drugs) in a residential health service setting (short-term).

### Non-Direct Service Definitions

Administration (10%) \$1,489,476

Under current legislation, 10% of grant funds are to be used to provide program administration and Planning Council Support.

Program Administration is responsible for the effective administration of the Ryan White Part A award. It includes developing and enhancing mechanisms that allow access to a comprehensive continuum of high quality, community-based care for low-income individuals and families living with HIV. The recipient Administration is responsible for implementing the Planning Council's plan for services. The implementation plan includes:

- distribution of funds following Planning Council priorities and allocations
- ensuring that services are available and accessible to eligible clients
- developing and implementing requests for proposals
- monitoring contracted providers
- working with agencies to maximize distributed funds
- · providing technical assistance and support to subrecipients
- preparing and submitting Part A funding applications; and
- completing all required federal reporting requirements

Planning Council program staff support the coordination and facilitation of Part A Boston EMA HIV/AIDS Services Planning Council. The Planning Council is responsible for the development of an annual needs assessment and funding streams assessment; completion of a resource and allocation process; development of a comprehensive plan for the provision of HIV/AIDS services.

### Quality Management (4.25%)

\$ 632,681

Under current legislation, 5% of grant funds are to be used to provide quality management support.

Quality Management staff and resources support direct service medical providers funded through the Ryan White Act to assure that funded services adhere to established HIV clinical practice standards and Public Health Service (PHS) guidelines; implementing strategies for improvements to quality medical care including vital health-related supportive services to achieve appropriate access and adherence with HIV medical care; and utilizing available demographic, clinical and health care utilization information and health outcome data to monitor the spectrum of HIV-related illnesses and trends in the local epidemic and the impact of Part A services. The Quality Management program aims to build capacity across the Boston EMA to engage in Quality Improvement with training, technical assistance, mini-grants, and other tools.
