Elders Living at Home	(ELAHP) supports elders in making the transition out of homeless and provides supportive services that build on the individual abilities of elders and to help them overcome the barriers to permanent housing. ELAHP serves elders in greatest need, including non-English-speaking elders and other marginalized individuals. ELAHP is committed to providing high- quality services in a respectful manner that will help each client reach his or her highest potential. The ELAHP model encompasses service, advocacy, research and education on the causes of and solutions to elder homelessness. Birth Sisters	Birth Sisters is a home visiting and labor support program that assists low-income expectant and new mothers at risk for complications due to medical or social factors such as social isolation, domestic violence, infants with anticipated significant medical problems such as but not limited to low birth weight, and families with complex psychosocial issues. A Birth Sister from the same culture and community as the mother assists during pregnancy, childbirth and early motherhood; she becomes a crucial link between the family and health care system. Birth Sisters, typically unskilled women, and provides them with a certificate upon successful completion of the program. The women are paid an hourly wage for their services, helping them economically. Birth Sisters offers an entryway to the workforce. StreetCred focuses on reducing child poverly and is committed to maximizing access to the Earned Income Tax Credit for eligible filters, returning as much as ~\$6,000 in tax credits to eligible filters who, based on their low income may not otherwise file, but benefit from the increased financial stability provided by the tax refund. The BAHEC's Youth to Health Careers (Y2HC) initiative works to increase youth knowledge, awareness, and pursuit of health careers through academic enrichment, job shadowing, leadership training, and college preparation. Central to the Y2HC initiative is a six-week Summer Enrichment Program, during which participating students take courses in math, science, public health, and personal wellness topics such as nutrition and healthy relationships.
